
David will be giving a talk about sustainable living by giving us a virtual tour of a model sustainable house in Lansing.

YAHRZEIT DATE CONVERSION INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Go to Hebcal.com
- 2. On the right-hand side of the screen, click on "Date Converter."
- 3. On the right-hand side of the screen, enter the Hebrew date from the list, changing the year to 5784 if Hebcal has not changed it.
- 4. Click on "Convert to Gregorian."
- 5. The corresponding Gregorian date will appear to the left of the Hebrew date.

For example, the Yahrzeit for Marty Horan, Marcia's father, is 21 Cheshvan. Entering 21 Cheshvan 5784 in Hebcal gives a corresponding Gregorian date of November 5, 2023.

A rough correspondence of the months of the Hebrew calendar and months of the Gregorian calendar is as follows:

HEBREW MONTH	GREGORIAN MONTHS
Tishrei	September-October
Cheshvan	October-November
Kislev	November-December
Tevet	December-January
Shevat	January-February
Adar (Adar I and Adar II in a leap year)	February- March/April
Nisan	March – April
Iyar	April-May

Tammuz	June-July
Av	July-August
Elul	August-September
