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
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From the Desk of Rabbi Matthew

This February we usher in the month of Adar. Or, more precisely, we usher in the first of two months of Adar in a row. This doubling of the month of Adar is something that recurs seven times in a nineteen-year cycle. It is popularly referred to as a Jewish leap year. What this means is that this Jewish year has thirteen months instead of twelve! The Jewish calendar was fixed this way so that the lunar cycle can be calibrated with the solar cycle, thus preserving the placement of Jewish holidays (roughly) around the same time of year. This recalibration is why we experience the Jewish holidays as falling "late" this year. In a Jewish leap year such as this, the first month of Adar is essentially a filler month, one in which no holidays occur but exists simply to expand the year.

That said, Adar I is full of activity at KI! On February 10th, we mark HIAS's annual Refugee Shabbat by welcoming Shaarey Zedek to join us for Shabbat morning services and we will have a special guest speaker known to a number of KI people -- Mira Sussman, the Resource Development Manager at Jewish Family Services of Washtenaw County, where she focuses on supporting the resettlement programs and developing affordable housing for this population (see flyer in this newsletter for more information). And on March 2nd, we look forward to a special KI "school shabbat," when we will showcase our eager young KI'ers during our shabbat morning services. I look forward to seeing you at both of these special occasions!

Lovingkindness in a Time of War

Can individual acts of loving-kindness really make a difference with Israel and Hamas at war? Rabbi Amy Eilberg, a longtime peace activist, says yes. Eilberg, the first woman ordained by the Conservative movement, believes that nearly everyone with a connection to Israel and Gaza — and maybe even those without such a direct connection — are experiencing pain and trauma. In this podcast, Eilberg explains that so many of us are consuming every op-ed and podcast about the conflict as a means to avoid deep pain. She shares her decades-long journey into metta meditation and how she turned to it after October 7. We also discuss how even though many Jews have felt isolated in recent months, she doesn't buy into the narrative that the whole world is against Jews. Nor has she given up on coalition-building or the importance of anti-racism efforts. This is a pastoral conversation in which she addresses the feelings of pain, anger and hopelessness that host Bryan Schwartzman, and many others, have experienced during wartime. It's about how individuals might seek healing and, maybe, how Jewish communities can address trauma to become healthier.

KIvunim

We've begun preparing for the next school shabbat which will happen on March 2ndl. As part of our work, the entire school has started an in depth text study of that day's portion— Ki Tisa (Exodus 32), the story of the golden calf. As we began our text study, it became clear that the children did not understand what it meant to "worship" as the Israelites did at the altar with the golden calf. This led us into an interesting discussion the following Wednesday during kitah bet, led by Rabbi Matthewwhere we talked about what worship is in the Torah/Tanakh and how that connects to what we do in synagogue today. We'll continue exploring this idea of what we do in Jewish liturgy/ritual and why we do it, leaving room to fully explore the idea of how those practices do or don't connect to the children's way of thinking.



In that Wednesday discussion about "worship," I asked the children if they hold a concept of "God." I explicitly stated that any/all answers were correct, so long as it was what felt true inside of them. Several children said they did. One child said that they did not, but that they value coming to KI and joining in all the things we do because they love being with the people. I love this vision for why one would choose to do or be Jewish. I suspect many of us feel much closer to this concept than that of a greater presence called God. So let's look forward to being together and gathering on March 2nd to celebrate being Jewish. Am yisrael chai. The people of Israel live.



This lecture focuses on Italian writer and intellectual Giorgio Bassani (1916-2000) and his identity as a Jewish author and "visual writer". Dr. Bini will also examine Bassani's relationship with his mentor, Italy's leading art critic and historian Roberto Longhi (1890-1970), and more particularly the influence of Longhi's teaching on Bassani's literary production in terms of re-elaboration of the medium of the artistic image.



Francesca Bini, Ph.D. in Romance Literatures from Ludwig-Maximilians-University Munich, specializes in Italian literature, literary criticism, aesthetics, and visual culture studies. As a visiting scholar at Vanderbilt University, she lectured on the literary and filmic works of Pier Paolo Pasolini, exploring connections to Roberto Longhi's teachings. Bini co-authored "Arte e Letteratura nel nome di Roberto Longhi. Bassani, Pasolini, Testori" and curated an exhibition of the same title at Biblioteca Ariostea in Ferrara (April - June 2023). Her research delves into the interplay between verbal and visual arts, particularly the concept of "ekphrasis."

Emotions in Yiddish Ghetto Diaries: Encountering Persecutors and Questioning Humanity

Dr. Simon will discuss her new book which uses an empathic reading of Yiddish diarists' feelings, evaluations, and assessments about persecutors in the Warsaw, Lodz, and Vilna ghettos to present an emotional history of persecution in the Nazi ghettos. It recenters the daily experiences of psychological and physical violence that made up ghetto life and that ultimately led victims to use their diaries as a place of agency to question and attempt to maintain their own beliefs in pre-war Jewish and Enlightenment ethics and morality.

She holds the William and Audrey Farber Family Chair in Holocaust Studies and European Jewish History at MSU. She also won a 2022 MSU university-wide Teacher-Scholar award.
